## From the Principal

A modern school looks and works in a completely different way to what you probably experienced at school, teachers no longer work in isolation, collaboration is fundamental to getting things done. The strongest influence on teacher's professional practice is advice from colleagues, and teachers get better by working in teams.

I thought that today, I would share how the staff have been working to ensure that we are learning, providing the highest standard of instruction to your children that we can. Your teachers have been visiting other classes observing each other's practices and attending professional learning workshops in literacy and discussing with each other ways to improve the literacy instruction for your children. They have been videoing and recording their lessons and discussing ways that they could improve how they are questioning and directing the children's learning. All the staff are working and planning in teams, analysing your children's work and closely monitoring the children's progress. They have set benchmarks for your children's literacy and are working diligently towards achieving these goals for the children. It is complex work, and the staff have embraced these new ways of working because of the benefits it provides to the children and to their work as professionals.

My role as principal has changed dramatically during my 15 years as a principal, I am part of this collaboration and I am also learning in a different way to when I was first appointed as principal. One of the best sources of professional learning for me comes via twitter where I am able to share experience and knowledge with other educators around the world.

When you think about it the kindergarten children of 2016 were born in 2010. If their parents were 30 when they were born, they probably left school about 1999. So much of our world has changed since then. Technology and the internet has changed the world and the school life these kindergarten children have commenced should prepare them for a world to come, rather than a world that has been.

The essential skills of the modern schools include collaboration, problem-solving, analytical thinking, creativity and resilience. These skills can be more effectively taught and modelled in a school that should look and feel significantly different from the experience of one teacher and 30 students locked in a room all day learning from texts that will need to be reprinted every couple of years.

Outside the school gate, our young people experience a dynamic, innovative and creative world, yet so often it is a foreign environment. Many educators are now passionate about transforming schools; they are questioning the relevance of the accepted processes of assessment and delivery of content. They are not seeking to transform schools to make their job better or easier; they believe if they are to engage young people as learners then schools must be radically different.

Nostalgia often paints a picture of the school that parents may seek for their children. This picture can be informed by happy memories or the sense that "it didn't do me any harm", to which I want to reply, "but maybe it would in this current age". We need to think differently and use the thinking and demands of this century to ensure that the education we are providing will ensure that the children reach their full potential.

Teachers really need your support and encouragement to keep developing as learners themselves. You can do this by supporting them with home reading, visiting classrooms and helping them, write a kind note occasionally, saying kind things about them in front of your child, being understanding if they make an occasional error.

Enrolment interviews for next years kindergarten has begun. If you have a child commencing school next year now is the time to fill in applications and book an interview. I want our school to be fully utilised and we have some great things happening in terms of improving the facilities in the near future. We also have some fantastic teaching happening in our great school. You need to tell your friends and family.

## BUILDING CHILD SAFE COMMUNITIES NEW FORMS FOR ALL VOLUNTEERS AND CONTRACTORS

'Building Child Safe Communities' is a new initiative developed by Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta that enhances our commitment to ensuring the safety and wellbeing of all students in our care. It is now a requirement that all volunteers and contractors complete an online undertaking form that confirms expectations in relation to behaviour whilst volunteering or contracting at schools, Catholic Out of Schools Hours Care and Catholic Early Learning Centres. This undertaking form also seeks to determine the suitability of volunteers and contractors by requiring them to declare that they do not have a criminal history involving children.

Then click on 'Volunteer Form' (halfway down page).

You will receive a confirmation email once the form has been submitted. Your details are maintained confidentially in a central database and a copy of your confirmation is emailed to the location where you are volunteering.

• **Contractors** – please click on '<u>Building Child Safe Communities – Undertaking for Contractors</u> or access the form via the Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta public webpage <u>http://www.parra.catholic.edu.au</u>, then click on 'Child Protection Training Forms' (halfway down page on the right hand side).



Then click on '<u>Contractor Form</u>' (bottom of page).

You will receive a confirmation email once the form has been submitted. Your details are maintained confidentially in a central database and a copy of your confirmation is emailed to the location where you are contracting.

A new form is required:

- For each location that you are a volunteer or contractor
- If any of the details you have provided on the form change

# SCHOOL HOLIDAY MUSIC WORKSHOPS

2-Day Concert Band Workshop

Tone, Technique and Timing: This 2-day intensive workshop is for beginner and intermediate students (up to Grade 3) who play a concert band instrument. The workshop will focus on ensemble and performance technique, culminating in a concert showcasing the pieces developed throughout the two days. Student musicians from Years 3 to 12 (aged 8 to 18) who play one of the following concert band instruments from an approximate standard of AMEB preliminary to Grade 3 are invited to apply: Piccolo, Flute, Oboe, Clarinet, Bass Clarinet, Bassoon, French Horn, Trumpet, Trombone, Tuba, Timpani and Percussion (including drums).

2-Day Strings Workshop

All about the Bow: Calling all beginner and intermediate students who play Violin, Viola, Cello or the Double Bass! These exciting sessions will address bowing techniques, ensemble playing and pitch in a relaxed, fun environment. The focus of the workshop will be ensemble technique and performance technique and will culminate in a concert showcasing the pieces developed throughout the two days. Applications are open to student musicians from Years 3 to 12 (aged 8 to 18) who play an orchestral string instrument from an approximate standard of AMEB preliminary to Grade 3.
